
Our Mission: The "3 Possibles"

A Snapshot of the MA Elder Home Care Program



Avg. age 80.7 years

21% age 90+



63,104 Consumers Served 55.8% live alone





36.2% clinically eligible for nursing facility care



\$300m per year in cost-avoidance as a result of diverted nursing facility care.

52% fall risk with intervention



46% supported by a trained workforce, therapy services, and EBP.



2.7 yrs avg. length enrolled







115% confirmed allegations




97% in reports






Five Simple Steps to Becoming an Effective Advocate

FY22 BUDGET PROCESS



MHC FY22 State Budget Priorities

Restore Critical Elder Program Accounts to FY21 Funding Levels

- \$1.3 million for 9110-1633, Elder Home Care Case Management
- \$776,495 for 9110-1636, Elder Protective Services

Earmark \$1 million for the SHINE Program

Add \$400,000 to Support Elder Mental Health Outreach Teams (EMHOT)

Add \$27.9 million for the Enough Pay to Stay Initiative to increase compensation to frontline homemakers, personal care homemakers, and home health aides
